# Highlights of recent meetings June

Cllr Staff advised that the Emergency Plan has been sent to SCC Emergency Planning Officer Keith Falkner Simpson for ratification prior to local distribution and introduction.

Cllr Baly raised concerns of local residents over recent unauthorised camping and camp fires on the common. Any future incidents should be reported to police and fire services immediately along with dates and photographic evidence if possible.

Cllr Hayward suggested the Parish Council should initiate a Village Fun Day event in summer 2018. It was agreed she would liaise with Cllr Baly over this.

Countryside Projects Officer Neil Lister is gauging interest in creating a Community Tree Nurseries scheme in Suffolk Coast and Heaths. It was agreed to reply with a tentative 'yes' on behalf of Knodishall.

Planning – DC/15/5073/OUT, The Firs, 65 Leiston Road. Concerned were raised by the council over access and height and character of proposed dwellings.

#### July

An analytics check of visitors to KPC website in the past month revealed 52% were returning and 48% were new visitors.

Community Payback have volunteered to cut and clear around the pond and play area

on a regular basis. Concerns were also raised about overgrown footpaths.

Cllrs Mayhew and Baly raised the issue of effectively maintaining and progressing the Play Area. It was agreed to evaluate options over the next few meetings.

Cllr Lister made a strong complaint to SCDC about the continuing lack of action over the overgrown and neglected state of 9 Hillcrest. SCDC Jones said the requisite process was continuing and that she would follow it up and report back.

## August

Following completion of the statutory electoral period for the Casual Vacancy, Nigel Black of Provident Cottage, St Andrews Road was proposed and seconded for cooption onto the Parish Council, and duly elected as parish councillor.

The Clerk advised receipt of the Conclusion of Audit Certificate for KPC 2016 -17. In accordance with Transparency Code requirements for small parish councils, the relevant documents were available for review either by appointment with the Clerk or via the website Finance page.

The Clerk had reported increased sightings of Himalayan Balsam in the River Hundred to Stephen Quinn at the Environment Agency. He advised he was aware of it from last year and it would be monitored ahead of routine maintenance later this year. Natural England and Suffolk Wildlife were also copied in.

Planning – DC/15/5073/OUT, The Firs, 65 Leiston Road. Following the requested review, the Planning Application for this development was approved by SCDC.

Parish Council Meetings are held at 7.30pm on the third Wednesday of each month in the Methodist Hall. All are welcome. ## Plan for the Future of the District

A new local plan for Suffolk Coastal District is being prepared and you have an opportunity to take part in its preparation. A Local Plan sets out the level of growth which needs to be planned in an area and identifies where that growth should be located and how it should be delivered up to 2036. Local issues for Suffolk Coastal cover a range of topics such as tourism, climate change, environment and design. Public drop-in sessions are being held over the issues and options with a consultation period running from August 18<sup>th</sup> to October 30<sup>th</sup>.

## A Villager's Notes

As autumn and winter bring darkness over the land, and we exchange summer activities for a more sedentary, indoor life we in Knodishall have much to contemplate. Not least the question of light and whether we can have more of it.

We can be proud that the British not only passed the time of day productively and happily for many hundreds of years, but moreover, in the pomp and confidence of Victorian times we formally invented it in 1855 when Greenwich became the world's epicentre by virtue of standing astride 0° longitude. From then the world knew what the time was by setting their clocks to Greenwich Mean Time plus or minus a few hours depending on their longitude. This changed in

the First World War when the Germans invented daylight saving to increase production. They cunningly put their clocks back by one hour in the spring of 1915. Not to be outdone we swiftly followed suit, and in the Second World War we stole a further march by moving our clocks back a full two hours during spring and summer.

Amidst all this one might wonder why France which is largely on almost the same longitude as ourselves are on Central European Time and not GMT – they moved to CET during their German occupation in the war and have remained so since. The upshot of all this is that we can quite easily have more light if we choose, especially if it enables us to increase production in the face of Brexit.

## **Knodishall Carpet Bowls Club**

With around 50 members the club is the largest in the Heritage Carpet Bowls League and probably the largest in Suffolk. Two teams, A and B, represent the club in the Heritage League and we are currently looking forward to the start of the 2017/18 league season with the first game on September 28<sup>th</sup>.

During the summer with many of our members taking to the greens for outdoor bowling, those remaining have for the last five years entered the Suffolk Carpet Bowls Association's Summer League, competing against 35 club teams. Knodishall have won this competition twice, but this year the trophy went to Barking.

The club also hosts a less competitive session on Monday afternoons starting at 2pm. This social session offers friendly bowling with gentle exercise and the opportunity for a chat and refreshments. New members will receive a warm welcome in the village hall.

## **Community Speed Watch**

Suffolk Police are committed to working with Roadsafe partners to achieve casualty reduction targets and reduce serious injuries and fatalities on our roads. But officers cannot carry out regular speed enforcement checks in every community on a regular basis, so they are recruiting Community Speed Watch volunteers. Trained volunteers can verify and record registration numbers of speeding vehicles and Suffolk Police will send offenders a letter. Persistent offenders may be targeted for police enforcement.

There need to be at least six volunteers in each scheme including a co-ordinator

responsible for equipment and administration. The cost of training and admin is covered by the police, but not the cost of speed detection equipment so this cost must be taken into account. If you are interested in volunteering and getting a group together please contact the Parish Council.

#### Oil-club.co.uk

The Oil-Club has launched a new club for Saxmundham and surrounding area. It is an independent organisation whose aim is to reduce the cost of heating for its members. By grouping deliveries by village they are able to negotiate the best bulk purchase price for heating oil, and pass savings on to members. ## The Common Rambler

Although the common was not teeming with butterflies this year there has been a good selection. Butterflies tend to have a specific flight period, the Orange Tip being one of the earliest is on the wing in April and May. Some have as many as three broods so are about over a longer period.

There was a good showing of Ringlets, a darkish brown butterfly with a thin golden yellow frill on the wings. When it settles it reveals small rings on the underside, rather like bulls eyes of white, black and gold.

Another butterfly doing well is the Comma, orange with distinctive black markings. It looks as though someone has chewed the edges of its wings to create a jagged appearance. When closed they reveal a very dark brown with a golden comma on each wing. Hence the name! Other butterflies seen include Red Admiral, Peacock, Painted Lady, Cabbage White, Small Skipper, Gatekeeper,

Speckled Wood, Small Copper and Holly Blue.

Walking across the old football pitch in early July I came across a few cinnabar moths, obviously just emerged from their pupae. The black and red wings had not dried off and they were incapable of proper flight. Like most moths they fly nocturnally. Their bright yellow and black caterpillars feed on ragwort and they pupate on or just below ground.

In my spring notes I mentioned the first migrant, the Chiffchaff. One was still calling in early September, 6 months of singing! Winter migrants will be arriving next month. Look out for field fares near the Old Post Office.

## **Spotted on the Buxlow Road**

An unusual sighting has been reported, of an adult bittern in Buxlow. It stood in the middle of the road for a while and then in its own good time walked into the field and flew off. Is this a first for Knodishall?
